# UPDATE ON Archaeology



Well, 2020 has certainly been an interesting year! Among the casualties of the necessary social distancing protocols put in place this year has been the Castle Museum's volunteer program. Volunteers have always been a vital component of the Museum's archaeology team and their absence had a profound effect. Still, despite the temporary cessation of our regular volunteer program, the Castle Museum was able to conduct a productive field season.

Fieldwork kicked off this spring with an inadvertent, but fortuitous, discovery of several flakes (the waste product from making stone tools) while hiking in one of our county parks. After securing permission from park officials, we (my son was drafted into volunteer status) returned to the site, which was assigned the official State site number 20SA1444, to map in and collect the artifacts that were exposed on the surface. In addition to numerous flakes, we found a projectile point (arrowhead), a broken biface fragment (stone tool fragment), two tiny pieces of pottery, and several fire-cracked rocks.

Another project conducted off and on throughout the field season was a continuation of our site monitoring efforts in the Shiawassee National Wildlife Refuge. This project, which has been ongoing in one form or another since 1999, currently involves monitoring known archaeological sites and mapping the locations of any artifacts or features that may be exposed through erosion or other natural processes. These processes were accelerated this spring when excessive rainfall upstream lead to dam failures and severe flooding. As a result, erosion occurred at sites along the Tittabawassee River exposing several historic and prehistoric artifacts and features. The flooding also resulted in the deposition of sediment on the surface (alluviation) to an extent not previously seen during the course of this project.

The majority of our field time this summer was spent at the Spencer Woods locale of the Spencer Farm site in Bridgeport Township. Shovel-testing in 2019 revealed a small scatter of Late Woodland ceramics at this site. We returned to the location this year to see if we could find any material to go with the ceramics that might give us a better idea of what activities may have been conducted at the site and what time of the year it was occupied. The project was marked by an ongoing dispute with a local woodchuck about the proper way to excavate a test unit! We ended up excavating 19 square meters, but, unfortunately, did not find any trash pits, hearths, or other features. In addition to more ceramics, we did find a few flaked stone artifacts, but nothing temporally diagnostic.

In early July, test excavations at the Spencer Woods site were paused for a couple of weeks while we conducted a shovel-test survey in Frankentrost at a site thought to be the location of the original Immanuel Lutheran Church building. We found many artifacts dating from the mid-19th through the early 20th century, which is not surprising given the site has been continuously occupied since 1848. Unfortunately, we found that the ground in the area where the original log structure is thought to have been located has been plowed, thus likely destroying any trace of the original building.



Finally, the aforementioned dam failures on the Tittabawassee River upstream from Saginaw resulted in the exposure of several archaeological sites that had been inundated since the construction of the dams. One of the sites, located in Gladwin County, contains remnants of a late 19th century, steam-powered lumber mill. I had the opportunity to spend a couple of weekends surveying and mapping the site with colleagues from Central Michigan, Oakland, and Saginaw Valley State universities and the Gladwin County Historical Society - all the while masked up and socially distant! The site contained remnants of brick and timber foundations, a brick chimney, a wood dam/log boom, and artifacts related to the structure and operation of the mill.

So, despite the limitation of not being able to field a full archaeology team, the Castle Museum still managed to have a productive season. Our attention now shifts to processing, analyzing, writing up, and sharing the results of our fieldwork.

As we progress into 2021, I am looking forward to reopening the lab and welcoming back the volunteers who are so vital to our archaeology program.

# OUR Collections



Although 2020 came with the challenge of COVID-19, staff, volunteers, and interns continued the process of cataloging the object, library, photographic, and blueprint collections in addition to new acquisitions!

Check out some of our most notable accomplishments below!

## 17 EXHIBITS

were installed in 2020, along with 30 continuing exhibits on display at the Castle Museum.

## 2 COLLECTION COMMITTEE ACQUISITION MEETINGS

were held during 2020. Approximately 332 artifacts from 66 donors were approved for donation throughout the year.

# 1557 ARTIFACTS

were entered into PastPerfect during the year, bringing the total number of objects entered into the collections database to 81,688. Objects: 38,149; Photos: 29,220; Archives: 10,331; and Library: 3,988.

Not included in this total, are the numerous updates we continue to make for artifacts already entered into PastPerfect.

## 10 RESEARCHERS

utilized the collections in person before the pandemic & over 130 research questions were answered by phone, email, or mail.








EACH ITEM IS CAREFULLY RESEARCHED AND VETTED. AFTER BEING REVIEWED BY THE ACCESSIONS COMMITTEE, OBJECTS ARE APPROVED FOR ACCEPTANCE INTO THE COLLECTION BY THE HSSC BOARD OF DIRECTORS. ALTHOUGH IT IS A TRULY ECLECTIC MIXTURE OF ITEMS, EACH OBJECT SHARES ONE THING IN COMMON: IT TELLS A UNIQUELY SAGINAW COUNTY STORY.





HERE ARE A FEW THINGS THAT WE COLLECTED THIS YEAR:

- A MASK AND PHOTOGRAPHS - WHILE OUR COLLECTION IS BUILT THROUGH DONATIONS, WE WORK TO DOCUMENT AND PRESERVE CURRENT OBJECTS THAT WILL ENABLE US TO TELL COMMUNITY STORIES IN THE FUTURE. IN PARTICULAR, WE HAVE FOCUSED ON THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC IN 2020 BY ADDING PHOTOS AND PERSONAL PROTECTIVE GEAR, SUCH AS MASKS TO OUR COLLECTION.
- PATENT MODEL OF A BEET HARVESTER (U.S. PATENT #984,572) INVENTED BY EDWARD LANG OF KOCHVILLE TOWNSHIP. THE DONATION INCLUDED DOCUMENTS COLLECTED BY THE INVENTOR.
- AN ALBUM OF PHOTOGRAPHS DOCUMENTING THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE POLICE TARGET RANGE ON THE GROUNDS OF THE SAGINAW WATERWORKS.





- A BOUND MANUSCRIPT TITLED: "PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF EAST SAGINAW MICH; STATISTICS AND VIEWS," C. 1874. A UNIQUE, IRREPLACEABLE MANUSCRIPT INCLUDES PHOTOGRAPHS AND ESSAYS DOCUMENTING EACH EAST SAGINAW SCHOOL IN THE 3RD QUARTER OF THE 19TH CENTURY.
- A TRAVEL DIARY RECORDING A TRIP TO EUROPE BY EDWARD W. MORLEY. THE JOURNAL STARTS DECEMBER 9, 1887, AND RECORDS A TRIP THAT INCLUDES FRANCE, ITALY, SWITZERLAND, ENGLAND AND ENDS WITH AN ENTRY FROM SARATOGA SPRINGS, NY DATED AUGUST 26, 1888. TICKETS, MAPS, AND PRESSED FLOWERS ARE TAPED INTO THE VOLUME.
- A 1910 BROOKS BOAT COMPANY CATALOG. THIS ITEM HAS LONG BEEN ON OUR LIST OF ITEMS TO ACQUIRE. IN EXCELLENT CONDITION, THIS IS AN EXTRAORDINARY COPY OF A VERY RARE CATALOG.
- SILVER-PLATED TROPHY, M.H.S.A.A. TENNIS SINGLES, 1926, AWARDED TO BURROWS MORLEY. THIS PIECE HAS EXCELLENT EXHIBIT AND DOCUMENTARY VALUE. BURROWS MORLEY WOULD BECOME THE PRESIDENT OF HIS FAMILY'S WHOLESALE HARDWARE COMPANY, MORLEY BROTHERS. BURROWS "BUZZ" MORLEY WAS A FRIEND OF SAGINAW-BORN POET THEODORE ROETHKE AND THEIR COMPETITIVE TENNIS GAMES ARE RECORDED IN SEEGER'S BIOGRAPHY OF ROETHKE.
- CAB STAND USED IN SAGINAW. THIS STAND FOR A YELLOW CAB WAS USED BY WILLIAM (BILL) POUND.


## Community Engagement Grant






